# Pierce County Fire Chiefs' Association Business Meeting Minutes September 3, 2015

### 1. Call to Order

Vice President Baskett called the Pierce County Fire Chiefs' Association meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. at Puyallup Library located at 324 Meridian Ave, WA. There were 43 people in attendance according to the sign in sheet (copy attached).

### 2. Flag Salute

Chief Wright led the flag salute and welcomed everyone to Central Pierce. Thanked everyone for attending today. Cups with fair tickets are available for everyone. CP has been busy this summer and wants to thank pretty much everyone here for sending people to help out, etc. Appreciates all the help.

### 3. Approval of Minutes

It was moved by Pat Donovan and seconded by Lloyd Christianson to approve the June 4, 2015 meeting minutes as presented. MOTION CARRIED.

### 4. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Bob Vellias presented the Treasurer's Report (copy attached). Beginning balance was \$10,510.83, revenues of \$0.15, expenses of \$0.00 for an Ending balance of \$10,510.98. EMS Account had a beginning balance of \$7,080.71, revenues of \$0.00, expenses of \$0.00 and an ending balance of \$7,080.71 for a Grand Total Account Balance of \$17,591.69. It was moved and seconded to approve the Treasurer's Report as presented. MOTION CARRIED.

### 5. Correspondence

### 6. Guest Speaker - PC Assessor Treasurer Mike Lonergan and Kim Fleshman

Vice President Ryan Baskett introduced and welcomed PC Assessor Treasurer Mike Lonergan. Thanked everyone for all you do. Kim is the levy clerk (business cards distributed). Looks toward customers and collects funds for. Distributed hand out, see attached. 100+ different taxing jurisdictions. Some taxes are collected county-wide. Everyone has property tax, not all States have sales tax and/or income tax. Sound Transit going to vote to get some of property tax. They already receive some from Gas Tax, Sales Tax, Motor Vehicle tax, etc. Doesn't feel appropriate for them to also receive from property tax as well. State School tax likely to become larger. More going to education, puts the squeeze on everyone. Likely going to be more and more resistance from voters. Executive Management meeting was held yesterday morning. Budget and Finance Director stated sales tax projection, which is volatile, over projected this year. Pointed out good to have property tax which is more stable. Permitted additions to property and/or new construction is picking up. This year over 1.2 billion dollars in new construction in the County this year. 2/3 residential. Approximately 1 ½ % added to the County. Back side of handout is actual

increases of residential properties in each of Fire Districts. Average of 5.5% overall increase. Anderson Island only one that dropped 2.4%. 6.5% county-wide increase. Commercial activity slowly coming back at 2.5%. Heading in the right direction which increases tax base. 1/6 of the County physically look at properties every year. About half way through now for this year. Re-value every property in the County every year. Still looks like we are trending upward. Turned floor over to Kim and what her process is and where she's at in the process. Special thank you to all of you and all of your employees - lives in the middle of where Sunrise fire and Ikea fire was, appreciates all you and your employees do. Online tutorial link for levy workshop (see handout). Many Fire Districts limited at maximum rate dependent on what value of District does. Every year in September sends out highest lawful calculation worksheet. Cities and Towns need to make sure reporting permits to them. Many do so electronically. Resolution or Ordinance states how much allowed. Levy Certification is total regular levy, excess levy and/or EMS levy by November 30th and what is used for calculations. Will contact District if there is additional revenue for amended Levy Certificate. This is done in December. The Association thanked Mike Lonergan and Kim for their presentation.

- A. Mutual Aid Agreements President Sagers reminded everyone to approve these with their Boards, Councils, etc. and return a copy to Denise. So far only 6 have been returned leaving 15 that have not been returned yet.

Todd reported – other venues unable to match what had been paying. Going to be at the same place. Changing up the process a little based on the surveys that came back. Social portion will be longer to be able to connect, etc. Awards portion will be shorter. Looking at entertainment, not sure if that will be a possibility or not. Another survey item was the cost, which currently covers the cost. Biggest thing from the survey was to have more social time.

### 11. Nominations Committee

Keith Wright reported everyone currently serving on the Board is willing to remain. If anyone is interested in running for a position, he will be sending an email out. Committee members are himself and John Burgess, needs one more committee member.

### 12. UASI Committee

Pat McElligot reported no activity.

### 13. Emergency Management Committee

Guy Allen reported it has been busy this year (see handouts) snapshot as of September 1<sup>st</sup> what the current complex fires are. Other handout is a log he created for County / Region / State Mobilizations for 2015. Enhances necessity for people to attend the pre-season meeting held in June, which will most likely be moved to May with the season starting earlier. Some issues ran into this year — Type 1 Engine being sent over with non-red carded individuals. Looking to coordinate a guidance process for billing process. Had at one point 6 brush, 6 type 1, 3 tenders, 5 strike team members and IMT members all deployed at one time. Pierce County has been busy. Don't have any information on Alder Lake Fire — Garry Olson stated has one tender on it. Forest Service is running that fire. Busier than normal year.

### 14. Impact/Mitigation Fee Committee

Bob Vellias reported no report.

### 15. CISM Committee

No representative present. President Sagers stated looking for someone to be on this to work with the Chaplaincy. Pat McElligott thought Chris Gilbraith was going to be involved. Will check and report back.

### **DIVISION REPORTS - Detailed:**

### 16. EMS

Russ McCallion reported protocols should be updated and released in first quarter of next year. Need to look at better ways in future to do updates. Flu season is approaching. CDC changed recommendation for vaccinating kids – no longer use live virus – same vaccine as everyone else. Sept 1<sup>st</sup> new billing starts – ICD10 for billing Medicare and Medicaid. What this means for us is demanding more specificity as to why patient was treated, etc. Will need to step up our game on documenting more appropriately and better narratives in reports so we don't lose revenue. Community Paramedics moving forward with state-wide ad hoc group. Collaborative process in WA State. Already working on some programs in the county. Need to be careful and deliberate with what we do.

Todd reported Divert continues to be a problem. Back in 2008 when at its worst, 20% down to 0.8% dramatic effect. Steadily creeping up over the last 2 years to 6% and even closer to 10% now. A lot of factors associated with – census with hospital ERs is up higher than the 6% - more patients going to the hospital. We've exhausted many abilities in ER to relieve that – nurses in triage area, etc. Running into problems in other areas. The key to making all of that happen back in 2008 was a letter from Dr. Waffle that this can't happen, and will go to a no divert status, etc. Also had decision makers at the meeting. Bringing Dr. Waffle back into the committee. Will continue working on this issue and change the make-up of the committee.

Certificate of Need by Multicare? Todd stated there will be some emergent beds - building a new facility for that - 3-4 years down the road before that happens. Not just mental health

 it is a strain on our resources. Divert problem is not just because of that, so many more people going to the ED. Russ McCallion stated also aging population utilizing medicine more.

Rural Metro AMR merger, Falk is also in the County. In a relatively good position here. Creekmore reported DuPont's average of 3 transports has gone up to 14 transports due to availability of Falk.

### 16 A. Metro Training

Doug Walker reported a couple of updates in July finished up 2 days of quarterly joint training drill. Thanked everyone for participation. All 3 shifts got to see same building drilled in. Great successes. Have not met with ops group to discuss specific lessons learned yet. Next quarter drill will be hosted by CPFR. Chief Mason has info on Officer Training Academy they have been working on. Mason reported working on developing a Training Officer Academy – core list of classes, subject matter they feel is important. Handout distributed. Still looking at conceptual on how the program will work. Have looked at King County program. Next step is narrowing classes down and then looking at instructors and validate instructors. Progressing and hoping to have ready for 2017.

### 16 B. <u>Training – TEW Training/Exercise</u>

No representative present. Judd – dormant since last round of funds.

### 16 C. Training - TEW Equipment

No representative present.

### 17. Fire and Life Safety

Ed Hrivnak introduced Ray Cochran from City of Puyallup Building and Planning. Kudos to DEM for being proactive for education process with wildland interface fires. 25 acres Emerald Ridge fire used their draft for getting evacuation notices out. Working on final draft, a lot of collaboration. One of things learned on after action – don't have enough PIO's. Have a South Sound PIO group – just to help manage the flow of information. First fire = Emerald Ridge fire and then few weeks later = Sunrise fire. When naming a fire, have learned that the name should be named based on the communities impacted – i.e. Emerald Ridge fire should have been named Lipoma Firs. So it makes sense to the residents and doesn't create confusion in the media, etc. Swan Creek fire was appropriately named.

Warner, self and Ray getting info from Legislators, State, etc. regarding wildand urban interface concerns, issues, etc. 2012 adopted and left up to local jurisdictions to adopt and enforce. It's out there and been approved. In light of fires and weather predictions, should look at and see what is appropriate for our jurisdictions. Warner stated another issue is pressure from politicians regarding fireworks bans, etc. More to come on that.

### 18. Logistics

Steve Richards reported their last meeting discussed joint RFPs, have not met through the summer.

### 19. Operations

Ed Goodlet stated nothing to report. Tac Ops manual under review by Training. Hopefully adopt in the next month or two.

### 20. Volunteer Services

No representative present.

### 21. Good of the Order

President Sagers welcomed EPFR Chief Bud Backer. Also, Chief Vellias is now the official Fire Chief in Eatonville.

Keith Wright reported the State Chiefs working legislatively as well on the fireworks issues/concerns. Warner Webb stated he wants to work in partnership with State Chiefs.

Keith Wright reported GEMT update funding measure coming. Healthcare is working on the State Plan Amendment (SPA). They are hiring a person to manage that program which is good news. Should have SPA in the next 2 to 3 months. Could take a year with the Feds or so. Email updates will be coming.

PCSORT meeting following this meeting.

Alan Predmore reported the PC IMT teams deployed a few times – Emerald Ridge Fire and Okanogan County on 20<sup>th</sup> or 21<sup>st</sup> for 9 days. PC Type 3 IMT is being used and building a high level of competence and good reputation. Couple meetings ago Jim Sharp talked about negotiation of contracts for fire protection with state facilities – model contract and fee structure – if municipal fire department 9 cents per square foot, and fire district = 18 cents per square foot. Process is going on. Association of WA Cities and State Chiefs are working on this as well. Not just DSHS facilities – any state facility, which will affect everyone.


